

UCSD Generation Rx By Greg Estep, P-2 and Nathan Painter, Pharm.D.

The goal of Generation Rx for UCSD was straightforward: to reach as many high school and middle school students as possible. However, this was not to be conducted in a drawn out manner, but as efficiently as possible, in order to maximize effectiveness. This project hit the ground running, with two training sessions and three presentations all done in the last three months. Not to mention that Generation Rx has two excellent Faculty Advisors, Dr. Eduardo Fricovsky and Dr. Nathan Painter.

Thirty-nine student pharmacists attended the two training sessions and Team Generation Rx was born. The training sessions were interactive and sought to immerse

the student pharmacists in the role of their student audience. From these trainings it became apparent that modifications and increasing the interactive nature of the Generation Rx base materials would be necessary. In addition, some sort of a hook to grab the attention of students would be needed. Student pharmacists Tiffany Tom (P1) and Greg Estep (P2) worked together to create a fourminute DVD video that would catch the students' attention. The inaugural site for the UCSD Generation Rx project was Memorial Preparatory for Scholars and Athletes, a middle school in San Diego. Seventeen hour-long sessions were held over two hours by 16 UCSD Generation Rx team

members, reaching 510 students. The feedback was great and there was engagement between the students and the presenters. The next school was Olympian High School where 13 sessions were conducted with 15 Generation Rx team members presenting over two hours and reaching 390 students. Dr. Painter, who came to show his support of *Continued on next page*

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the students, says "the students gave excellent presentations and were able to relate to the high school students. Prescription drug abuse is a serious problem in the country and in the San Diego area. This is a great way to help educate kids early." All of the presentations have been great and everyone involved had a great time.

We are looking forward to putting on a play based on Generation Rx and Dr. Nathan Painter is developing a Generation Rx elective for SSPPS students. The elective course will be geared towards increasing proficiency for giving presentations and center on the subject of prescription drug abuse. It is still in the planning stages, but currently the inaugural class is scheduled to be held in the fall of 2012. The future looks very bright for Generation Rx.

Almutairi Lab Publishes on Breakthrough Polymeric Material for Drug Delivery

Dr. Adah Almutairi's group recently created a polymer that can break down into small molecules in response to low power near infrared light. Because this form of light can safely penetrate several centimeters deep into tissues, encapsulating or enmeshing drugs or other biologically active molecules in this breakthrough material would allow researchers or clinicians to noninvasively control the time and location of their delivery.


No other polymer with this capability has yet been designed. The resulting publication, whose lead authors were

postdocs Nadia Fomina and Cathryn McFearin, was featured on the cover of the journal *Macromolecules*. Because the work is so exciting, it has received considerable media attention from biotech publications and was covered in an article on ScienceNOW.

While most targeted delivery systems require understanding of how diseased tissue differs from healthy tissue on a molecular level, a light-degradable material would allow delivery of treatment for any disease. This material could also be useful as a research tool, allowing uniform, noninvasive delivery of drugs, proteins, or siRNAs at desired time points without genetic manipulation.

Because near infrared light is such a useful potential remote trigger for drug delivery, other types of delivery vehicles that respond to it have been developed. However, these assemblies require relatively high power irradiation, which is not as safe as the stimulus to which Almutairi's polymer is sensitive, and release their contents by disassembling rather than breaking down into small molecules that can be easily cleared from the body.

Dr. Almutairi's group is currently working on developing polymers with even greater sensitivity to infrared and with different chemical properties to allow a wider variety of formulations.






of the inaugural CTRI Awards for Outstanding Posters. Expect all of
