Exposure to Blood/Body Fluids

If you come in contact with another person's blood or body fluid (e.g., through a needle stick injury or mucous membrane splash) you must complete the following three steps:

- 1. Wash/flush area and contact supervisor
- 2. Depending on your location proceed with the following

Notify Navy Hospital Charge Nurse and Attending. Report to Navy Hospital Emergency Room immediately.

Other Sites

Contact your faculty supervisor and the Office of Experiential Education as soon as possible. In each location, the injury will be documented and hospital personnel will ask the patient for consent for HIV and hepatitis B & C testing if the patient's status is not known. The student will also be asked for serum for testing. The student should make a decision about whether to take antiretroviral medication until the patient's HIV status is known.

3. <u>All follow-up</u> is done at UC San Diego Center for Occupational & Environmental Medicine (COEM) <u>regardless</u> of where the injury happened.
